These tests help in diagnosing liver diseases like hepatitis, fatty liver, jaundice, liver infection, and liver damage caused by alcohol or medicines. Abnormal LFT values may indicate inflammation, blockage of bile ducts, or impaired liver function. LFT is also used to monitor the progress of liver disease and response to treatment.

This test is important for early diagnosis, monitoring, and preventing the spread of hepatitis B.

PT measures the clotting time in seconds, while INR (International Normalized Ratio) standardizes the result so it can be compared across different laboratories. Abnormal PT/INR values may indicate bleeding disorders, liver disease, vitamin K deficiency, or the effects of blood-thinning medications.
